Coronavirus (Covid-19)

Everyone will be aware of the various announcements made by Public Health Scotland and the Government regarding the new Omicron variant of the coronavirus. In the Church we continue to respond to each of these announcements and follow such advice as is provided.

Although there are too many small things we take into account to announce you should know that we are working hard to keep Church one of the safest places that people can visit.

Obvious changes we have made is to cancel all tea and coffee after services and to increase the spacing available for seating. We have also cancelled a number of forthcoming events such as the proposed Burns Supper in January.

Whilst some of these changes have not been mandated it is evidence of the efforts we continue to make to keep everyone safe. At the time of writing this, as a consequence of the changes we have made, no services have had to be cancelled and most will be live-streamed.

Please be aware that arrangements for events intimated in this magazine and elsewhere may have to be changed. Some meetings are again taking place on Zoom.

Please check the church website for updates and guidance.

TESTING The Scottish Government recommend that before we mix with anyone outwith our own household we undertake a Lateral Flow Test. This may include visiting individuals or receiving a visit, attending a group or attending worship or a funeral. Everyone is encouraged to follow this guidance in relation to the life of the Church and community.

From the Minister

Mission Districts

Dear Friends,

I had occasion to look back at the first article I wrote for the Kirk News. I wrote it at the very start of the

coronavirus pandemic and I commented on the expression - 'the only constant in life is change!'

In commenting on it, I observed that 'change for many can be disturbing, unsettling and a cause of anxiety in itself. For others, it can be welcome, exciting and give a sense of opportunity and hope.'

We are presently in a curious situation. At the same time as many of us will feel there has been little change - we are still restricted in the numbers we can meet, we still have to wear masks at times, we are still concerned about the NHS's capability to cope etc, others will feel that everything has changed - we now have a vaccine and we have adapted to online worship and similar online activities.

January's online edition of Life & Work contains a prayer which focuses on the pandemic. However, many of the sentiments expressed could almost have been written for any time and any situation.

It begins:

"We stand at that place, betwixt and between the old and the new. Looking back to a year now past, and forward to what is yet to be. But this is not a normal transition between old and new."

By the time you read this most of you, if not all, will be aware of the new Edinburgh Presbytery Plan Consultation Document. Whatever your own personal view of the proposed changes, there are a couple of key facts that everyone in the Church of Scotland has to face. Firstly, we have too many church buildings some of which are poorly maintained and others of which are in the wrong place to best deliver mission. Secondly, we have too few ministers with no prospect of sufficient additional ministers being 'recruited' to replace the existing ones that are retiring.

As a result of the Consultation Document, after all the discussions we have had over the last year as part of the 'West Forth Cluster', we now find ourselves in 'Mission District D - West'. This new grouping sees an increase in the number of Churches we are being asked to work alongside from 6 to 13.

It has also resulted in one Church from our old cluster being moved into a new one. There are also a number of proposals surrounding the union of various Churches and the creation of new parishes. Some of these proposals appear obvious and fairly welcome, others are not so obvious and will require greater effort to envisage how they might work. This present consultation draft focuses on ministerial posts and does not yet address many of the issues relating to buildings.

The Life & Work prayer continues:

"In all our uncertainty we come to you, Lord, for you are constant. In the midst of uncertainty your love is sure. In the darkness of disappointment you never fail. In heartbreak and anguish your loving arms enfold us."

One thing that is evident in the new plans is that mission is key. This is no bad thing. Even the change of title - to call each of the new areas in Edinburgh Presbytery a Mission District - is geared towards showing the importance of mission to the continuation of the Church. I have spoken previously about mission and, in particular, 'The Five Marks of Mission'. (See Kirk News - October 2020 edition.) I commented, in that article, in relation to the Five Marks of Mission, that 'one of the things that struck me was how well the Blackhall St Columba's Mission Statement "To Glorify God.... to proclaim Christ..... to serve others" dovetails with them.'

As we work together with other churches in our new Mission District, we will continue to adhere to the Blackhall St Columba's Mission Statement. As we work with both the wider group and with those with whom we have been tasked with examining a closer union, this broad mission statement will serve all well, as will a closer look at the Five Marks of Mission.

Irrespective of what your feelings are about change, some sort of change is inevitable. I think it is worth remembering though that our feelings of uncertainty have been felt by those who have gone before us. Many who have shared our trepidation have captured their insights in scripture and they all point to one thing. The unchanging nature of God's love for us.

The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. (Lamentations 3:22-23)

For the mountains may depart and the hills be removed, but my steadfast love shall not depart from you, and my covenant of peace shall not be removed, says the Lord, who has compassion on you. (Isaiah 54:10) / continued

Know therefore that the Lord your God is God, the faithful God who maintains covenant loyalty with those who love him and keep his commandments, to a thousand generations, (Deuteronomy 7:9)

We have just passed through Christmas when we celebrated God incarnate, Emmanuel, God with us. God has been with us through the pandemic. He has been with us through our days of darkness and our days of light. As we move on in our lives, God has been, is now and always will be with us in our laughter and our tears, in our happiness and our sadness and in our times of certainty and uncertainty.

I conclude with the last verse from the Life & Work prayer:

"Continue to walk with us through these dark days, assure us of your light which no darkness can ever overcome and of your love by which we are constantly surrounded." Amen.

The Kirk Session met on Tuesday 9 November 2021.

Communion Cards

A decision has been taken to redesign our Invitation to Communion. A group of three has been charged with creating a new design for consideration at a future meeting.

Congregational Roll

Miss Elizabeth Baird, Easter Park Drive, was admitted by Resolution of the Kirk Session.

Correspondence

A letter was received from Fresh Start thanking the Congregation for our continuing support.

Elder Resignation

It was noted that Bill Davidson had intimated his resignation as an active Elder for health reasons. The Clerk advised that he would write thanking Bill for his long and faithful service to the Congregation.

Outreach Committee

Michael Cockburn, Convener, advised that a ceilidh was planned for March 2022.

Roles

It was noted that Donald Stirling had taken on the role of Health and Safety Officer, taking over from Ruth Laidlaw who had been appointed as Hall Convener.

New Presbytery Plan

In earlier editions of Kirk News I have endeavoured to keep members posted regarding progress with the new Presbytery Plan which will basically propose how the number of ministerial posts across the Presbytery of Edinburgh will drop from 78 to 48 within 5 years. This is in line with a decision taken by The General Assembly.

The consultative document has now been made available to Kirk Sessions. This is subject to discussion and the approved document will go forward to Church of Scotland Committees at 121 George Street as the draft Presbytery Plan. / continued

Kirk Session Report continued

This is a voluminous document and in summary, insofar as Blackhall St Columba's is concerned:-

- We would sit in the Mission District D West that encompasses the Corstorphine churches, Murrayfield, Gorgie Dalry Stenhouse, Palmerston Place, Cramond, Davidson's Mains, Old Kirk Muirhouse, Drylaw, St Stephen's Comely Bank and ourselves.
- It is proposed that Davidson's Mains, St Stephen's Comely Bank and ourselves will enter into a Union to be served by two Ministers. Consequently if agreed there would be one entity encompassing the three congregations and in due course it would be decided which of the two Ministers would be the Moderator of the single Kirk Session. The two Ministers would be of equal status. It follows that there would be one Session Clerk and one Treasurer unless, of course, there is a decision taken by the Kirk Session to go for a different management structure.

There is a special meeting of The Presbytery of Edinburgh in January solely to discuss the consultative document. Prior to that the Kirk Session will be meeting twice to discuss our position and formulate any comments and questions we wish to raise at the special meeting.

Church of Scotland announces Principal Clerk

appointment Published on 20 December 2021

The Church of Scotland has announced the selection of Rev Fiona Smith as the next Principal Clerk to the General Assembly.

The appointment will have to be confirmed by the General Assembly in May.

The current Principal Clerk Rev Dr George Whyte retires from the role following the General Assembly in May 2022.



Rev Fiona Smith as Principal Clerk designate will spend a period of time shadowing him prior to formal appointment.

Mrs Smith said: "It is a huge privilege to accept the appointment to become the next Principal Clerk but it was extremely hard telling my congregation yesterday.

"God called me to be the minister of Ness Bank Church in Inverness 12 years ago and it is God's call that is now leading me to new pastures."

Fiona has served in senior roles on a number of the Church's national committees.

She is currently Vice-Convener of the Registration of Ministries Committee, and has previously served as Convener of Assembly Business Committee and its predecessor the Assembly Arrangements Committee.

The role of the Principal Clerk is to act as the Clerk to the General Assembly, which includes advising the Assembly and the Moderator on church law, practice and procedure.

The Principal Clerk also supports the Moderator throughout the year as well as providing training courses and advice on church law and procedures to Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries, ministers and other church bodies.

In these times of change, challenge, reform and restructuring, the Principal Clerk has a key leadership role in supporting and enabling the traditional and emerging practices of the Church of Scotland within our framework of governance and law.

Tribute to Bruce Cannon 1932 - 2021

It was with sadness that we heard of the death of Bruce Cannon, a former stalwart member of Blackhall St Columba's Church until retirement took Bruce and his wife Karen to Perthshire in 1995.

Growing up in Blackhall, Bruce was educated at Blackhall Primary School and the Royal High School and is remembered as an enthusiastic member of the Church Youth Fellowship and a much respected Church Elder.

His strong Christian faith and a keen interest in news led him from copy boy with the Edinburgh Evening News in 1949 to the Church of Scotland at 121 George Street in 1965 where he was tasked with setting up its Press and Publicity Department. In 1974 he became Director of Communications at the Church of Scotland, a role which included responsibility for the 121 Church Bookshop, Life and Work magazine and media coverage of the events and debates of the General Assembly. Somewhere in this busy life Bruce also found time to contribute articles to our Blackhall Bulletin.

His interest in news and current affairs continued after retirement when, living in Perthshire and in Falkirk, both Bruce and Karen became active and enthusiastic members of u3a.

Sadly, Bruce died in hospital on 11 November 2021. Our thoughts are with his wife, Karen, sons David, John and Andrew, four grandchildren and two great-granddaughters.
