



WHAT ARE YOU GRATEFUL FOR?

As those who attend Blackhall St Columba's Church know, we enjoy humour and especially so if it comes with a message. The other day I read a joke about 'gratitude'.

A little old lady sold pretzels on the street corner for fifty cents each. Every day, a young lawyer would exit his office building at lunch and, as he passed her pretzel stand, he'd leave two quarters. However, he never took a pretzel.

This went on for nearly five years .Even though they never spoke, every day he'd leave fifty cents. They'd make eye contact, and she would nod her gratitude as he walked away without



This joke speaks volumes for how we, as humans, can often react. We very quickly take things for granted. We accept what we have as the normal state of affairs and become 'entitled'.

As you can tell, I think humour is important. Quite apart from the fun and enjoyment it can bring, it can also teach us important lessons by pointing out the absurdity of some of our positions. I like a variety of comedians, but not all of their jokes are suitable for a Sunday morning. One comedian who tells a lot of risqué jokes is Jimmy Carr. Although it is true that most of his humour would not be suitable for these pages, Jimmy Carr is also something of a philosopher. He has made a number of short video clips in which he shares his wisdom with those listening.

One of those clips related to the subject of gratitude and I have tried to quote him as accurately as I can. Jimmy said, "I don't know if you could be in a better place than you are right now. You have heard of body dysmorphia (dysmorphia = a deformity or abnormality in the shape or size of a specified part of the body) well some people have life dysmorphia.

A lot of people think their life is terrible because there is a hedonic (hedonic = pleasant) treadmill, you get used to how great your life is. No one had a hot shower until 50 years ago. I try to do this thing when you stand in a hot shower, just take a moment to realise that no one that you admire from 100 years ago had this simple pleasure in life and, when you look at the world we live in where there's been 100 billion people living ever, we are in the top, top percentile in terms of the luck we have had with luxuries."

Whatever you think of Jimmy Carr as a comedian, I think that he has that spot on. Even in my own lifetime, we have seen things like central heating and double glazing come into being. We take hot and cold running water for granted. We have seen the advent of television which has been enhanced first by videos, then DVDs, which have now led on to streaming services. We have seen calculators become computers and laptops. Our telephones have become mobile and include cameras and have the ability to video chat with others over different platforms. Our phones are also now able to be used as compasses, satellite navigation devices, notepads, calculators and even for shopping.

Honestly, as a society we have never had it so good and yet, also as a society, we have never had so many people who find themselves depressed and so many people who struggle with their mental health. Jimmy Carr, after his comments about people who are feeling bad, went on to quote Friedrich Nietzsche who commented on resentment. Nietzsche said, 'If you think someone's ruined your life, you're right. It's you.' Carr's observation on this was that 'gratitude is the cure for that'.

This attitude of gratitude has been known to Christians since the beginning of the Church. It was Paul who wrote to the Philippians saying; "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:4-7)

As we approach Easter, Christians have something even more important to be grateful for. We celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ as God's gift to the world, Emmanuel, God with us. However, at Easter, we mark the reason that God gave us that gift. We remember the life, death and, most importantly, the resurrection of Jesus. It was that resurrection that brought God's plan for the world into being. That plan is encapsulated in John's Gospel when we are told "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." (John 3:16)

This Easter, it is important that we remind ourselves of just how lucky we are. We have lived at peace for so long that things like Church and God are just taken for granted along with our hot water and other material luxuries. If we take these for granted, then there is a good chance we just don't think about them and then we don't actually appreciate how lucky we are, how lucky we are to have a God who invites all of humanity to have a relationship with him through Christ.


Sunday 6th April: *Sunday Lunch at the Toby Carvery*





Our final talk takes place after a brief AGM on Wednesday April 2nd when David Land will explain how Counting, Writing and Speaking are connected.






