

A Christmas Carol

And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching. (Hebrews 10:24-25)

What are your expectations for this Christmas and what, if any, are your Christmas worship traditions? As you might expect, I will be very busy over the Christmas period and, for me, the culmination of the celebration is a Family Service at 10:30am on Christmas Day. After that, I gather with family for a meal, the exchanging of gifts and often the watching of a film.



I'm sure, like me, many of you will have watched several film versions of Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol. I've seen classics like the 1951 film starring Alastair Sim (my personal favourite) or the 1984version with George C. Scott. I've also seen plenty of spin-offs and newly made takes on the story, such as the 1988 film with Bill Murray, Scrooged, or the 1992 film The Muppet Christmas Carol which featured Michael Caine as Scrooge. If I'm being honest, I also enjoyed the 1988 parody of the story, Blackadder's Christmas Carol, in which Rowan Atkinson, as Scrooge, took the opposite message from the one intended.

For anyone who doesn't know the story of the Dickens classic, it is a story about change and transformation. In all of these film portrayals of Dickens's story, Scrooge undergoes a magical transformation. He begins each film as an embittered, lonely, old man. At the start, he is generally vengeful, greedy and insulting to everyone he meets. Scrooge is visited by a former business partner, Jacob Marley, who warns him about where his behaviour and attitude will lead him. Marley then, with the help of the ghosts of Christmas past, present and future proceeds to show Scrooge the reality of his actions. The visions of ghosts have a profound effect and, in the final act of all the films, Scrooge is beside himself with childlike joy. He demonstrates exceptional generosity and, in particular, tries to make things better for his employee, Bob Cratchit and his family.

However, in all the films I've mentioned, there is one thing that Scrooge never does. He does not go to church on Christmas Day. Yet, according to Dickens's story, Scrooge does walk the streets on Christmas morning on his way to church. This event is quite wonderfully portrayed in the 1999 film version of A Christmas Carol, starring Patrick Stewart. Here, Scrooge not only goes to church but also joins in by singing the chorus of "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" with great gusto.

Although, there is nothing in the book to suggest that Scrooge becomes a frequent churchgoer, there is also nothing to suggest that he doesn't. Many people, who are not regular churchgoers, will make a special effort to attend at particular holy days such as Christmas and Easter. Scrooge's example can remind us that our response to the birth of Christ is something to be shared with other believers. We not only gather for Christmas dinner and festivities but also for Christmas worship. We come together, as was written in my opening scripture passage, to "provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some" (Hebrews 10:24-25).

I'm not suggesting that all Christians must attend corporate worship on Christmas Day though this is expected in some traditions, such as Roman Catholicism. We, at Blackhall St Columba's, host a number of services and special worship services around this time, many of them livestreamed. On Christmas Eve, we hold a 6pm Family Christingle Service and an 11:30pm Watchnight Service which spills over into the first minutes of Christmas Day. Worshipping on Christmas Eve allows us to begin our celebrations with corporate worship, remembering the true meaning of Christmas. There should be no fixed rules for how anyone celebrates Christmas, but I would encourage you to find some time to gather with God's people in worship on or around Christmas Day.

In Dickens's novella, Scrooge is transformed from being bitter, miserable and miserly to being happy, joyful and generous. It was part of the evidence of this transformation that Scrooge went to church on Christmas morning. The story of Scrooge reminds us that Christmas should be celebrated in community with others. As we gather with our families and or friends this year, let us remember that, in addition to the enjoyment we get from the occasion, it is, in fact, an occasion to worship God who sent his son, born in a stable and laid in a manger, to reconcile us back to Him. So, this year, in addition to the family festivities, let's be sure to take some time to gather for worship, even if we do so virtually.



NEW PUBLIC ACCESS DEFIBRILLATOR -(iPAD) at Blackhall St Columba's Church



We are happy to report that a life-saving defibrillator has been installed in the yellow cabinet located on the church hall, by the War Memorial. It faces the Queensferry Road, and

is clearly visible from the road.

It has been registered The National Defibrillator Network as being available 24/7, seven days a week, so that 999 call handlers can direct anyone responding to a cardiac arrest, to their nearest accessible defibrillator. Instructions on how to access the defibrillator in an emergency are detailed on the plaque beside the yellow cabinet.

The defibrillator has been provided by St John Scotland Community Defibrillator Scheme. They work with community groups, charities or individuals looking for support to install a defibrillator in their area.

Every week in Scotland around 70 people have a cardiac arrest in a public place, at home or at work. Starting CPR as soon as possible will give the best chance of survival, but being able to use the defibrillator within the first few minutes of collapse increases that chance even further.

Currently, enquiries are being made through St John on how to access CPR training as well as a demonstration of the iPAD. Training sessions will be advertised locally in the Kirk News, Blackhall Bulletin and the Church website when they become available.

A BIG THANK YOU FROM FRESH START

Following the Harvest Service on Sunday 8th October at Blackhall St. Columba's Church, a car load of fruit, vegetables and non-perishable items (that had been on display during that service) were delivered to The Pantry Shop at FreshStart in Ferry Road Drive. The staff and volunteers were delighted by the scale of the donations and very grateful to place them on their shelves. The Pantry and Finance Office where also delighted to receive £60 in cash which had been donated on the Sunday by some of the church members instead of goods. The cash will be used to purchase items that are rarely donated but always in demand by the Pantry Members.

Pantry manager Denise and Hub manager Abi are grateful that Blackhall St. Columba's Church is so generous to FreshStart and chose them to receive the Harvest Gifts-a big thank you from them and FreshStart.



The Pantry shop at FreshStart has been running now for around two years. The demand has grown significantly in the last year and now has around 300 members. Local residents on low incomes can apply to become members of The Pantry which entitles them to come once a week, pay the weekly subscription of £4.50 and then select the food and other items to a value of around £20. Unlike a Foodbank this is shopping with dignity and provides choice. With many different nationalities and cultures in the area that is very important. The Pantry is also a social space were staff and volunteers get to know the members and often help them to source other help through FreshStart or their partner organisations.

We regret to say that our Harvest Service donations will not be long on the shelves as this is a 52 weeks a year need, supporting 300 households.

Blackhall St. Columba's Church and the community have in the past (and hopefully going forward) been great at donating household goods but please remember The Pantry too. A few extra items in your weekly shop and then dropping them off on a Friday between 10 and 11.30am collection time in the church halls could make all the difference. Many thanks for your support and please keep the donations coming if you are able.



Getting to Know You......Sally Lyall of Captivate Theatre

In this second interview in the new series, we meet a local lady who has inspired countless children and young people, in our community and beyond, to take to the stage and perform musical theatre, with resounding success.






Running a drama club was always her dream, but she wasn't sure anyone would come. After starting in a hired space at Stewart's Melville, with her own children and all their friends, she found there was no shortage of children keen to join and so began the after-school Blackhall Drama Club. She now has classes at Blackhall, Davidson's Mains and Fettes, teaching over 200 children a week. She also runs Fringe Summer Schools that are both great fun and highly successful, with some regular adult performers having started with her at the age of 4! This year, she directed five shows, from Matilda jun to Les Miserables, each earning outstanding reviews. Sally acknowledges that being part of the Blackhall Community gave her the confidence to start up Captivate and provided her with much needed support in the early days.

Where did you live as a child, and can you share one of your earliest memories?

My early years were spent in Halifax and one of my earliest memories was the house literally shaking in the bitingly cold wind that blew through our housing estate.

Where did you go to senior school, and what was important to you at that time?

My family moved to St Ives in Cambridgeshire, and I spent many happy years at St Ivo Secondary School. My life was dominated by sport and drama – I played netball and hockey and was involved in all the school plays. An abiding memory was having just one line in our school musical – I lacked the confidence to sing in those days (I still can't sing well but I'm not embarrassed any more). I was heart-broken to have so little involvement, when many of my friends had big parts.





What about your student days?

I went to Goldsmith's College in London, to study English and History. I was too nervous to do drama and thought drama students would be wacky confident types that I'd be terrified of. Having met them, they were all lovely, so I switched to English and Drama – a decision that changed my life.

What brought you to Edinburgh?

When I left university, I did what everyone else from my course did – tried to get an agent, tried to get acting work, but did mostly waitressing. It was in 1990 that I decided I'd had enough of that lifestyle and moved to Edinburgh to find Stuart, whom I'd met in Portugal. We had a gorgeous flat on Rose Street and I've loved Edinburgh ever since.

Given your training and background, you must have seen some great stage performances – which actor made the deepest impression on you?

Mark Rylance as Hamlet in the mid 80s. He's an incredible actor and I reckon I saw it five times.

And your favourite film?

Withnail and I. Stuart and I know all the lines and there are some crackers.

Your favourite food?

Thai, absolutely. When we lived in Rose Street we used to go to a wee Thai restaurant. I think it was Edinburgh's first. The flavours are incredible and now there are Thai restaurants everywhere.

What is your "happy place" and how do you relax?

Stuart and I have recently got a camper van and that has become my happy place. In fact, as I write this we are on the ferry to Barra. I love being able to take off at a moment's notice and I love the peace and quiet we find. Every year, the Fringe is incredibly busy. I do very long days, am rubbish at delegating and there's huge pressure to succeed. To take off in the van at the end of this is just the tonic and it's amazing how quickly I manage to relax.

What is the most important thing life has taught you?

That as you get older, things get easier — well, for me, anyway. Young people, these days in particular, have a tough time. There are so many pressures and, worrying about what other people think, embarrassment and lack of confidence often feature. I can't say that I never doubt myself these days, but I am so much more confident than I used to be and drama has definitely helped. I think Drama should be in every school curriculum, from an early age, for confidence-building, socialising, sharing, listening, speaking up — and just being brave enough to stand up in front of a group and not feel anxious.

I hope that Blackhall continues to provide the 'village' community which makes it such a special place to live and bring up children. It's wonderful that so many young people in Blackhall have been part of Captivate's story. We'll soon be announcing the Edfringe Summer School shows for 2024 so keep an eye out on social media and come and see us at Edinburgh Academy next August.

Scotland's youngest author champions inclusive publishing with a delightful illustrated storybook in multiple accessible formats for all children to enjoy



Aged six, Eve Nairn-Magnante's imagination inspired her to write her first version of *Santa Steals Christmas!* Her father typed up the tale, as told to him by Eve, stowed it safely away and made plans to produce a single printed book as a surprise Christmas gift for when she was older. Now, aged 13, Eve has published an edited, up-to-date edition of this delightful seasonal story and made it truly accessible to **all** children.

Brought to life with charming illustrations by Nicholas Child, based on sketches provided by Eve, the story takes young readers and listeners on a journey with Santa as he and a cast of Christmassy characters solve a mystery just in time for the big day. It's a joyful, optimistic tale that highlights the true meaning of giving and receiving gifts – with plenty of twists, smiles and fun along the way.

Accessibility for all

In conceiving the original story, Eve imagined a world in which all children would feel seen and included. With that wish in mind, the print version of *Santa Steals Christmas!* was designed with Dyslexia Scotland and set in the Dyslexie font – a typeface designed by dyslexic people for those with dyslexia. A brilliant example of accessible design.

In addition to the dyslexia-friendly printed book, *Santa Steals Christmas!* has also been produced in additional accessible formats: enhanced audio description, British Sign Language video and a braille version came out in autumn.


About the author: Eve Nairn-Magnante



Born 2009 in Edinburgh, Scotland, Eve Nairn-Magnante has been creating stories ever since she can remember. At the age of six, she recounted the first version of *Santa Steals Christmas!* to her father, who immediately wanted to preserve it for her. He typed up the tale, as told to him by Eve, stowed it safely away and made plans to produce a single printed book as a surprise Christmas gift for when she was older.

Fast-forward to a meeting with one of Eve's teachers during the first lockdown, when he learned that Eve's writing projects at school were getting positive reviews. That's when he asked Eve to get involved and work alongside an illustrator to achieve her vision of the story. (Some good did come from Covid restrictions).

Working closely with children's book illustrator Nicholas Child, Eve provided sample drawings of the robots and input into the animal characters, Pretzel the dog and the two cats, Cookie and Basil and creative direction for the look and feel of the characters.



When she's not studying, writing or spending time with the family pets – cats Lucifer and Lizzie, and Harris the dog – Eve is an active member of youth-led samba drumming group Pulse of the Place, based in Leith. Eve recently travelled with the group to perform at New York City's annual Tartan Day Parade, with Gail Porter as Grand Marshal – another highlight in 2023, alongside releasing *Santa Steals Christmas!*

Eve has donated 50 copies of paperback and audio versions to Deaf Action: Dyslexia Scotland: Scottish Autism and Seescape Fife. Copies have also gone to Edinburgh Children's Hospital and Scottish Adult Learning Partnership.


HARVEST CEILIDH 2023


